

Primary School Graduation

INTRODUCTION

At the heart of equipping people for their lifelong faith formation are these four key faith practices: **Caring Conversations, Devotions, Service, and Rituals and Traditions.** As you celebrate this exciting time let them reflect on their primary years and look forward to the next stage of learning and independence. Let this Primary School Graduation **Growing Faith Moment** be a time to get excited for the next stage of their schooling.

This moment can take place in a small group or around the family table.



Invite the young person to share their answers to one or a number of the following questions:

- What is your favourite memory of primary school?
- What are you looking forward to in high school?
- What are you going to miss?
- Do you have any concerns about high school?

Talk about how Jesus will be beside them and walking with them as they move onto high school.

Talk about the main stages of school life and what will be different in a high school setting.
